This term in English we have been looking at the book 'The Spy Fox'. We have enjoyed watching clips of the story, and the students have recalled the story in their workbooks. The students were asked to identify the main subjects within the story and include different adjectives to describe the characters. The students are amazing at thinking of different adjectives and verbs they can use to be creative in their story writing.

This term we have worked around a theme of Rainforests. This has linked to Art where we have been very creative, making our own shoe box rainforests. We looked closely at the leaves of different trees, and how to draw a leaf, we then used these new skills to draw a full rainforest scene. There were some amazing drawings.



In Science we looked at the different layers of the rainforest, and animal habitats of animals that live in the rainforest layers. For Geography we looked at the locations of the different rainforests, and the reason why they are located on the equator.



The students are continuing to enjoy their sessions with Forest Green Rovers, and their PE sessions with Jurell. The students have taken part in lots of different activities including tennis cricket, football and basketball this term. We have also enjoyed our cooking lessons, using different skills such as cutting, mixing and measuring.

Upper Phase English



The students have shown great teamwork within the mini games and even in competitive matches, recognising different roles within the fielding team and using them to form strategies against the batting team. A highlight this term has been the determination the students have displayed to capture bases and make swift decisions occasionally communicated by their teammates or even frequently completely independently to score points and keep their team afloat.

PSHE Update

In PSHE this term, students have been learning about British Values, Racism and Misogyny. The Lower Phase have been focusing on what racism means, how to recognise and challenge racist and discriminatory scenarios and how hurtful words and actions can affect others. They then moved onto exploring different cultures and traditions and discussed their uniqueness.

Additionally, and with their form tutors, lower phase have been deep diving into the British Values, understanding fairness and respect, the importance of rules and loads and understanding the value of working together.

Similarly, the Upper Phase have had a particular focus on learning about our British Values; understanding how each one is incorporated into everyday life. Furthermore, they have covered a unit on understanding respect and how to show it, including different types of discrimination, whilst learning how to recognise and challenge it. Students have also covered the history behind racism, including looking at the life of Nelson Mandella and the abolishment of the Transatlantic Slave Trade.

Next term, students will be covering aspects around Personal Well-being and Sex Education.

Safeguarding Update

Welcome to the first input of our parent safeguarding bulletin. This bulletin is designed to support you as parents/carers in your understanding of Safeguarding in the context of Brookthorpe Hall School.

At Brookthorpe Hall School safeguarding is everyone's responsibility and every young person has a right to a voice. We believe that you can report your Safeguarding concern to a member of staff that you trust, have a therapeutic relationship with and that can ensure your concerns are heard.



Brookthorpe Hall are proud to be a part of the Operation Encompass Scheme. Your named key adult is Rhiannon Trevethan – DSL. We are looking to expand our key adult team soon.

Operation Encompass is an innovative project in which schools and nurseries in Gloucestershire are participating. Many other Local Authorities including the 5 other counties that we support within as well as nationally have successfully implemented Operation Encompass.

Operation Encompass commenced on 4th March 2019 for schools and 14th December 2020 for nurseries and aims to support children and young people who are affected by domestic abuse. Witnessing or experiencing domestic abuse is really distressing for a child or young person, who often see the abuse, hear it from another room, see a parent's injuries or distress afterwards, or can be physically hurt by trying to stop the abuse.

Each school has members of staff who have been fully trained in liaising with police and Children's Social Care when required and will ensure that the necessary support is made available to the child or young person following the notification of a domestic abuse incident. Initially it was based in Barton Street, Gloucester before moving to The George Whitefield Centre on Great Western Road in September 2009. We work with many local churches, schools and community groups, working together towards stopping hunger in our local area.

Gloucestershire Constabulary Safeguarding Alert

We have received a Safeguarding alert from Gloucestershire Constabulary. Please read the following information regarding the alert:

There is a new "trend" called SmartSchoolBoy9. SmartSchoolBoy9 is someone who may be acting inappropriately online. This individual is potentially masquerading as a child on social media to interact with children.

This situation has also led to increased discussions and concerns on social media. 'Copycat' accounts have emerged, and videos related to this issue are circulating in some schools. This has caused fear and anxiety among some younger children who have been exposed to this harmful content.
