Thank you to our psychotherapist, Fiona, for organising such a wonderful festival.












Shoelaces and Seeds!

PSHE Update

PSHE has turned a page this half term; we have moved onto learning about Independent Living Skills. The short half term has been the perfect amount of time to have a bit of fun whilst learning and exploring real life avenues.

Upper Phase worked hard learning about nutrition, looking at food groups, balanced diets and simple, but healthy meals that they can make at home. They even got to make a simple chicken wrap with salad, which they enjoyed eating in class!

They later moved onto learning about benefits of being amongst nature, and the importance of gardening for our environment and our minds, whilst planting their own sunflowers, carrots and potatoes!

Furthermore, and in our final week before the holiday, they will be helping to keep the school grounds tidy, including picking up rubbish, watering the plants and trimming back some trees.

Lower Phase has similarly looked at nutrition, meal preparation and balanced diets. They too have enjoyed planting their sunflowers, carrots and potatoes and later, next week, will move onto looking at how to stay safe in the community, including recognising unsafe situations and knowing emergency numbers.

Careers Update

This Term we had the second Army visit for Careers for Lower Phase. It was an interactive session, and the students asked lots of questions and enjoyed dressing up, looking at medals learning what items are stored in a soldier's kit including water purifying tablets and waterproof paper notebook.


PE Update

This term in PE we have moved onto athletics and explored different components of fitness which factor into sporting performance. We tested and measured power using the event of long jump, and tested agility using the Illinois agility test.

Long jump

Long jump has been both fun and educational, learning how to increase distance and using momentum to carry ourselves further. As well as seeing short term improvement in a lot of our students they found it extremely fun jumping and crashing onto the mats. Many students were willing to challenge themselves by increasing the distance which they needed to jump which further allowed us to explore the meaning of an 'invalid' attempt and 'remaining' attempts as the children really pushed themselves.







Safeguarding Update

This term our Safeguarding theme for staff CPD has been prevent and counterterrorism.

The aim of our Safeguarding theme this term, is to ensure we are keeping the young people within our school community safe within and outside of school. As a staff team, we have explored the indicators of radicalisation which includes behaviours and communication changes and what to do if we have a concern that a child is being radicalised or exploited, particularly online.

As parents it is important for you to be informed regarding Prevent as last year's prevent referrals across the UK (2024) were for young people aged between 11 and 15 years.

The Outcomes First Group policy "Protecting children from Radicalisation and extremism defines the categories within prevent as:

- •Radicalisation refers to the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and extremist ideologies associated with terrorist groups.
- •**Terrorism** (as defined in the Terrorism Act 2000) is an action that endangers or causes serious violence to a person/people; causes serious damage to property; or seriously interferes or disrupts an electronic system. The use or threat is designed to influence the government or to intimidate the public and is made for the purpose of advancing a political, religious or ideological cause.

Safeguarding Update

•Extremism is the promotion or advancement of an ideology based on violence, hatred or intolerance, which aims to: negate or destroy the fundamental rights and freedoms of others; or undermine, overturn or replace the UK's system of liberal parliamentary democracy and democratic rights; or intentionally create a permissive environment for others to achieve the results in (1) or (2). (updated from definition in the Prevent Duty 2011 New definition of extremism (2024))

The process of radicalisation is very subtle and can occur of a long period of time. The NSPCC shares that the process of radicalisation can include:

- being groomed online or in person
- exploitation, including sexual exploitation
- psychological manipulation
- exposure to violent material and other inappropriate information
- •the risk of physical harm or death through extremist acts.

In addition, the NSPCC outline indicators that a young person is being radicalised:

- •spend increasing amounts of time talking to people with extreme views (this includes online and offline communication)
- change their style of dress or personal appearance
- •lose interest in friends and activities that are not associated with the extremist ideology, group or cause
- •have material or symbols associated with an extreme cause
- try to recruit others to join the cause

What can you do as parents:

- •Create a safe space for them to talk
- Reassure them that you are there to help
- •Be curious and take an interest in their online friendships Additional information:
